Michigan enacts its first law to replace an adopted person's original birth record with an amended birth record. The amended record lists adoptive parents as birthparents.

1980

Motivated by a now repealed law that Minnesota enacted in 1977, Michigan creates a complex bureaucratic process for adult adoptees to obtain any information about their own identities.

2023-2024

Fifteen states have restored a right to possess your own birth record. Yet Michigan law for adopted people remains inequitable, discriminatory, and incomprehensibly complex.
